

My late grandfather, lovingly referred to a "Big Grandpa", who I had the pleasure of caring for at the end of his life. We have a family addiction to Coca-Cola.


My daughter, Lauren, who was diagnosed with Crohn's Disease at 17, and despite her struggles fights like a warrior to have a normal life.
